I have also been busy getting ready for this term's topic 'Stories from the UK', we will start off with the story of 'Robin Hood' then 2 more of my favourite stories, Percy the Park Keeper - 'The Rescue Party' by Nick Butterworth and 'The Jolly Postman' by The Ahlbergs. If you have these books at home that's great, but if not don't worry because they are available to watch and listen to online.

This week (1.6.20) we will be looking at 'Robin Hood'.

English 1

Grammar – Instead of writing our own diary we will be looking at some 'grammar' work this term. (If you want to continue with your diary of course that's fine). This week we are looking at punctuation marks ! and ?

English 2

Imagine that one day you were walking through the woods and you found the magic key, it began to glow! It took you to Robin Hood's Den.... What happens next? You can start your adventure story like this – just copy this story start – the writing in bold (or choose your own)

'One sunny morning I was walking in the woods with --- (you decide who is with you). I stumbled, I saw something shiny, it was a golden key! It started to glow ... (you can carry on with your own story now)

Don't forget to draw your illustrations too!

You might even have your own version of the Robin Hood story at home? How is your story the same or different? Do you think Robin Hood was a real person?

Maths –This week we will move on to using ‘sharing or division’ in our ‘using numbers’ task. You can see that this operation is linked to multiplication (in fact it is the opposite of multiplication), you will remember that it is important to group objects in equal sized groups as we did with multiplication.

Collect some equipment such as beads, counters, lego bricks etc... (as you did for multiplication). This time start with the total number, complete the sharing calculations in the table below ...

Weight – Over the next 2 weeks we are going to move on to measuring weight – looking at the terms heavy and light and then on to using scales.

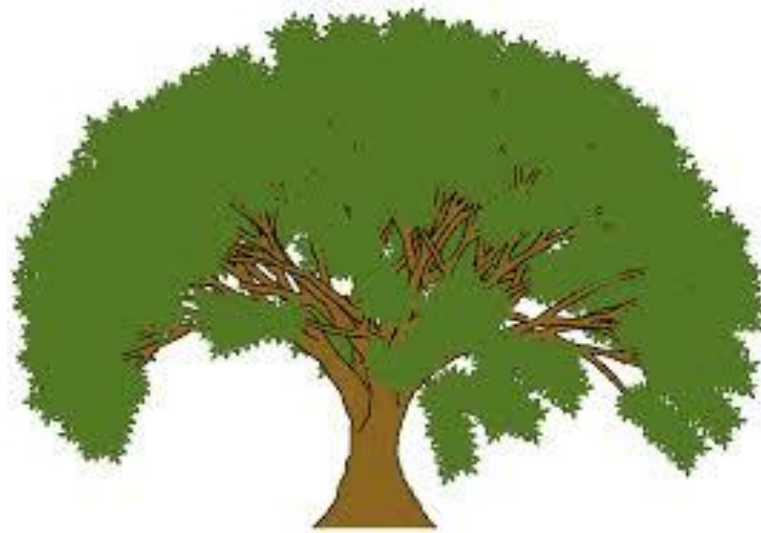
French – This week we are finding out how to talk about the weather in French.
